SUBJECT: Form of Payment - Bail

In addition to the payment methods specified in Administrative Rule 9.1(a), bail and any assessed convenience fee may be paid by credit or debit card as follows, unless specifically prohibited by court order:

- 1. Bail may be paid in person using a credit or debit card during regular business hours at court locations equipped with a credit card processing machine.
- 2. Bail may be paid online through CourtView, after a trial court clerk or corrections officer initiates payment arrangements on behalf of a defendant or a third-party wanting to post bond through the online bail clerk. Online payment is only possible after the defendant or bond poster submits a completed Online Secured Cash Bond Posting Agreement (CR-234).

If the **full** payment is not made within 120 hours after the online bail clerk adds the financial docket to the defendant's case in CourtView—or by the deadline set by the judge for out-of-custody defendants—any partial payments will be returned to the person who made the payment. To continue with online bail payment after that, a new request must be submitted to restart the process. Credit or debit card payments cannot be made over the phone.

The bulletin was amended to:

- Extend the period by which bail must be posted for defendants when a judge has
 not ordered a specific due date. The time period was extended from 72 hours to
 120 hours to allow more time for the defendant or a third-party to make necessary
 personal arrangements to post bail online.
- Address the possibility that a judge may order a different bail due date for out-ofcustody defendants.
- Clarify that if full payment is not made within the required timeframe, the CourtView financial dockets that enable online bail payments will be disabled.
 After that, anyone who still wants to post bail online must submit a new request to restart the process.
- Clarify that any partial payments will be returned to the bond poster after the bail due date lapses.
